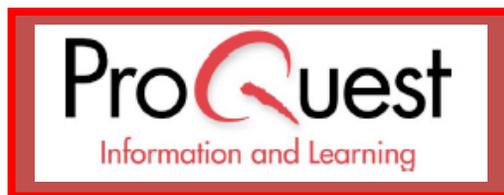

Free Access through May 1, 2009



The *Environmental Studies & Policy Collection* is a compilation of over 700 journals, periodicals and magazines, which provide robust coverage of environmental issues and policies, including diverse perspectives from the scientific community, governmental policy makers, as well as corporate interests. The free access also includes select access to eBooks.

Librarian Diane J. Bever, Interim Dean of the Library,
was presented a 30 Years of Service Award
by Stuart Green, Interim Chancellor, on January 30, 2009



Diane started as a visiting reference librarian on February 15, 1979. Many changes have taken place in the Indiana University Kokomo Library since 1979. Diane was here when the very first computer came into the Library in 1980. It was used by the library staff to access online cataloging information. Today, just under 100 computers are available for general use in the Library and Learning Commons.

The original library space in the main building was located in the areas that are now occupied by Education and Business faculty offices. The first library was later expanded to include a lower level. Finally, a new library building opened in January 1995 which more than doubled the amount of space available in the former library.

Multiform paper checkout (McBee) cards with sorting punch holes were the state of the art in checking out library materials in 1979. Today the Library uses barcodes read electronically scanning both the patron's library card and the item being checked out. The Library is acquiring more and more e-books. One day books may not be checked out at all—just downloaded.

Along with the growing Library, Diane advanced in her career from her beginnings as a Visiting Librarian to full rank Librarian. She was only the second of the Regional Campus librarians to achieve full rank status.

IT (SOMETIMES) PAYS TO BE SMALLER!

Have you ever said, "Our library doesn't have what I need for my research, I have to go to Bloomington or Indianapolis to get what I need." With the purchase of several journal full-text collections that may no longer be true. In fact, while Bloomington has several single-title journal subscriptions to Elsevier published titles they do not have the *ScienceDirect* collection. Often your Bloomington colleagues are now using the IU Kokomo Library to meet their research needs! How is that possible? Many publishers have larger discounted prices to institutions with smaller FTE so we are able to afford it when Bloomington cannot. Talk to a librarian and find out what is new and exciting at the library.



SAGE JOURNALS ONLINE

The Library has subscribed to *SAGE Journals Online*. This delivery platform provides full-text articles from 410 SAGE journals covering the subject areas of communication studies, criminology, education, health sciences, management & organization studies, materials science, political science, psychology, sociology, and urban studies & planning. Additional SAGE titles may be searched, but full-text will not be provided. You may browse the complete list of journal titles or limit to "Sage content available to me" which provides only those titles that IU Kokomo has full-text access to.

A reminder that as you use subject-oriented databases the **Look for It** link will retrieve available SAGE full-text articles. The SAGE journal titles are also accessible from [Journal Finder](#).

Useful Tool Offers Variety of Local Data

The Indiana Department of Workforce Development's [Hoosiers by the Numbers](#) Web site includes a new [County Highlights](#) feature that is full of data about the communities where you and your students live and work. Go to County Highlights, click a county on the map of Indiana, then select from eight different sections on each county profile: Overview, Population, Education, Commuting, Labor Force, Industry, Income, and Firm Size. Each section contains a variety of information in narrative, tables, charts, and graphs formats. Choose [Howard County's Industry section](#), for example, and view Average Employment by Sector for the county.

As stated on the Web site, the data is updated throughout the year, not just on an annual basis. The resulting tables and charts list their sources and are printable from the screen. Or download the data you need into Word, Excel, or PDF formats using the links on the top, right-hand side of the screen.

IndianaMap Turned 52 on March 18



Fifty-two Indiana counties share data with *IndianaMap*, that is, according to a recent [press release](#) from the Indiana Geographic Information Council. [IndianaMap](#) is an electronic statewide map for Indiana. It is used to help manage things such as hiking trails, business development, and highway construction projects. It is particularly valuable in emergency response and recovery efforts. If you've ever searched for something regarding Indiana on Google Maps, it's highly likely that the aerial photography came from *IndianaMap*.

The state Geographic Information Office was created on July 1, 2007 by Indiana Code 4-23-7.3 and located within the [Indiana Office of Technology](#) to coordinate GIS activities statewide. The [Indiana Geographic Information Council](#) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit membership organization of GIS users, professionals, and educators. Administered by an elected board of directors, IGIC is recognized as the official statewide coordinating body for Indiana geographic information.
